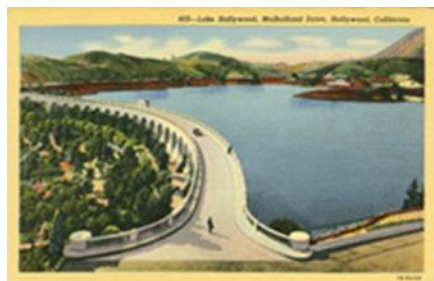

Postcard Collections



With over one million postcards, the Department of Archives and Special Collections holds one of the largest publicly accessible postcard collections in the United States. LMU's postcard collections are comprised of thematic cards and view cards from all over the world. Werner von Boltensstern Postcard Collection:

The Werner von Boltensstern Postcard Collection is the core of our postcard collections. Werner von Boltensstern was born in Berlin, Germany in 1904. He immigrated to the United States in 1947 and settled in Los Angeles where he pursued a career as a free-lance photographer. His profession apparently sparked his interest in postcards and postcard collecting. Von Boltensstern amassed an enormous personal collection, which he donated to Loyola University in 1967. He continued to add to this collection until his death in 1978. Since then, LMU's postcard holdings have continued to grow through donations.

Generally, postcards are organized into two categories: view cards and thematic cards.

View cards are arranged alphabetically by geographic locations. Nearly every country is represented. Dates of publication range from the early 20th century to the present.

Thematic cards are arranged by topics, such as advertising cards, ethnographic cards, greeting cards, and political cards. Cards made of various materials, such as leather, wood, copper, and embroidery, are represented in the postcard collections. There are also a large number of early postal cards known as government-issue cards from the late 19th century.
